

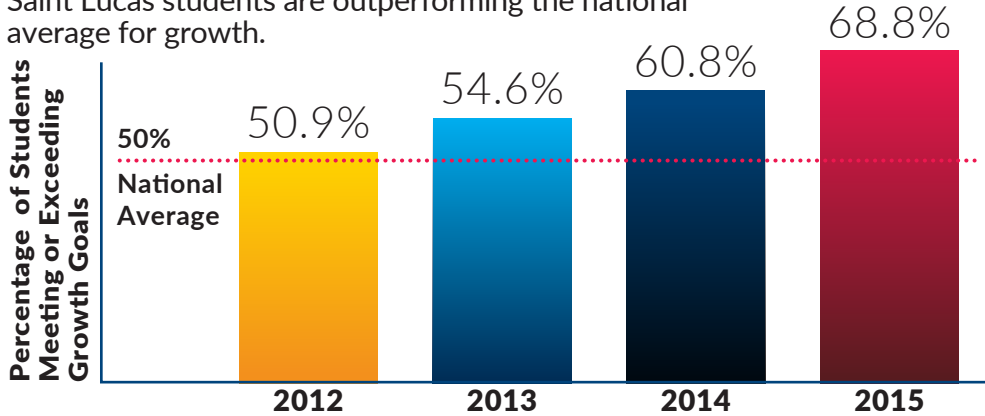

Saint Lucas students are outperforming the national average for growth.

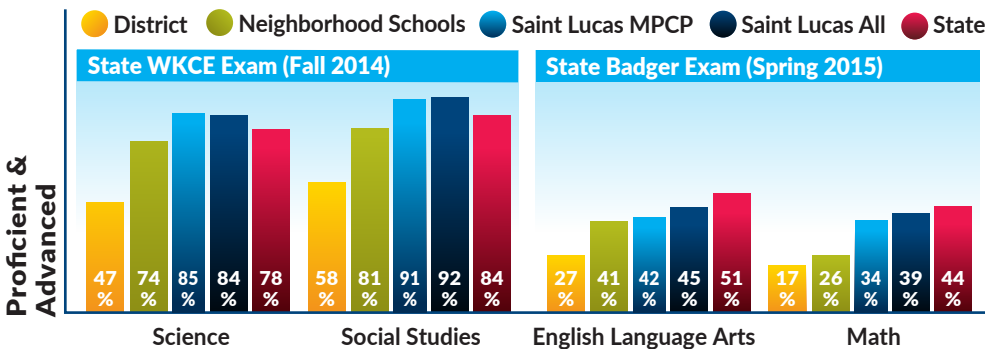


Schoolwide, students averaged more than 140% growth across all subjects. (One year of growth equals 100%.)

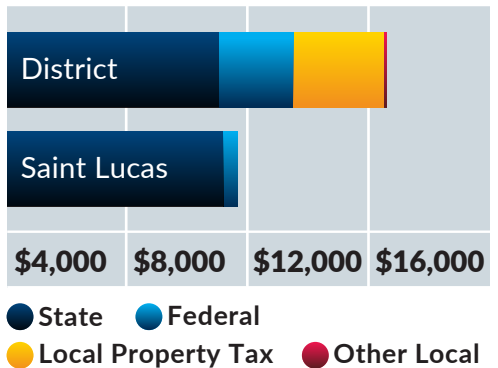
Saint Lucas eighth-graders outperformed students nationwide in eighth, ninth, 10th and 11th grades in reading, math, language and science.

Saint Lucas enrollment is up **68 percent** since 2009

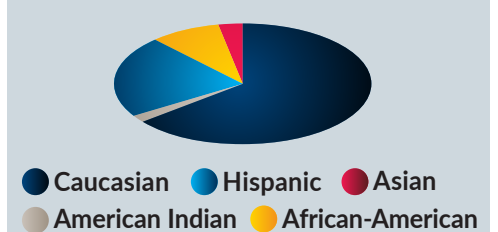


GreatSchools' School Chooser

More About the Report Card Statistics

Measures of Academic Progress (MAP)

Saint Lucas uses a variety of tools to assess student achievement and growth, including a nationally norm-referenced test called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP). The MAP assessments are produced by the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), a global not-for-profit educational services organization. Norm-referenced tests compare a student's score against the scores of a national group of students. We administer the MAP test to students in kindergarten through eighth grade. Unlike state tests, MAP allows us to compare the performance of our students to their grade-level peers across state lines. We can also track student performance across time. On the MAP assessment, the 50th percentile is considered grade level. Saint Lucas' 2015 Report Card reflects NWEA's 2015 national norms.

Wisconsin State Test

Every state administers criterion-referenced tests in order to assess student academic achievement. Each state has a unique test. The results of these exams allow us to compare the performance of students at private, charter and traditional public schools that receive publicly funded revenue. The Wisconsin state test does not allow us to assess how our children are doing compared to their peers in different states. On this chart, "Saint Lucas MPCP" reports the performance of students enrolled in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program. "Saint Lucas All" reports the results of all students. The state test is administered to students in third through eighth grade. The state used the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam for science and social studies. The Badger Exam was used for math and English language arts. The neighborhood average was calculated using the Department of Public Instruction's data for K-8 schools within two miles of Saint Lucas.

Revenue for Publicly Funded Schools

The budget numbers reported are from Milwaukee Public Schools' Fiscal Year 2015 Budget. District numbers exclude revenue from the extension fund and the non-public schools' allocation. These numbers are excluded because they are not directly related to the cost of educating MPS students. The Extension Fund is for Recreation Department activities and benefits all Milwaukee residents.

The non-public schools' allocation is funding in the MPS budget that is earmarked for students at non-public schools (e.g., title services). The budget also does not include donations from private grants.

Enrollment Growth

The enrollment numbers reported are from the Department of Public Instruction's Third Friday Count in September 2014.

GreatSchools

GreatSchools is an independent, nonprofit organization that empowers parents with information and tools so they can choose the best school for their children.

Race/Ethnicity

This graph reports the race/ethnicity numbers from students enrolled on the Third Friday Count in September 2014.

Attendance

The attendance rate measures the days of school actually attended as a percentage of all possible days of attendance. We measure absences in quarter-day increments.

Annual Student Return Rate

This number is calculated by counting the total number of students who were enrolled at Saint Lucas on the Department of Public Instruction's Third Friday Count in September of 2013, minus graduates, and determining how many of those same students were present on the Third Friday Count in September of 2014.

High School Graduation

Saint Lucas tracks its rate of high school graduation based on those students (alumni) who complete eighth grade. We began tracking this data with the Saint Lucas class of 2009. Those students graduated high school in 2013.

Enrolled in Choice Program

This number reports the percentage of students enrolled in the Parental Choice Program on the Third Friday Count in September of 2014.
